# HISTORY OF NEWENCO



The New England College of Optometry was established in 1894 as the Klein School of Optics by August A. Klein, a Boston ophthalmologist. The program of study was one year long and two students were graduated at the end of the first year. In 1909 the course was expanded to two years, offered as the last two years of high school education.

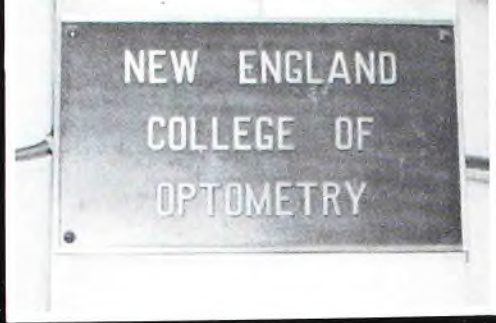




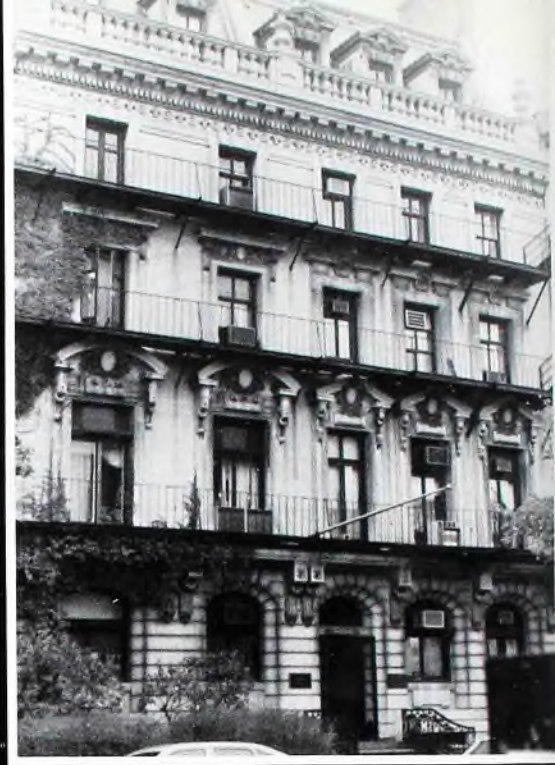
The Klein School of Optics became the Massachusetts School of Optometry in 1919 and by 1930 required four years of high school prior to enrolling in the two year program. The curriculum at MSO expanded to three years in 1934 and to four years in 1939. The school was again renamed in 1946 to the Massachusetts College of Optometry. The college occupied the Horace Mann Building located on the corner of Newbury and Exeter Streets. The facilities of the building were adequate for the total enrollment of the college at that time - - - less than 200 students. During the 1950's MCO was given the right to confer the Bachelor of Science degree in Optometry and then the Doctor of Optometry degree. The academic prerequisites also changed to two years of college coursework. MCO as well as the profession grew over the next two decades until 1971 when the college moved from Newbury Street to its present home on Beacon Street.

***"Knowing that fourth year would be our last was a more exciting prospect than the fourth year itself. On our first day I arrived at Newbury Street only to find out that the school had been moved over the summer. Why had the senior class not been notified? Were they saving money on stamps? Maybe they figured that those seniors who found the new school would graduate and the rest of us would just be out of luck."***

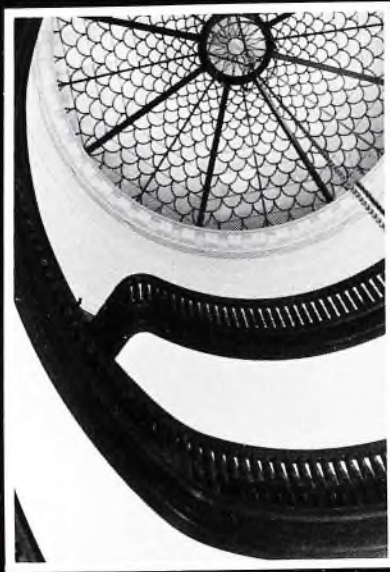




The institution changed its name to the New England College of Optometry in 1976 to more accurately reflect the diverse backgrounds of the college's student population. Approximately two-thirds of all students enrolled at NEWENCO are from the six New England states. Today NEWENCO is a four year professional program for students with at least three years of college and offers a two year program for persons holding Ph.D's in the sciences.



**NAMAIS HALL:** named after a memorable professor of the college, Dr. Foster Namais. Its most striking feature is the spiral staircase in the central rotunda. This building was actually two residences which were built in 1904.



**THE DORMITORY:** was acquired in 1983.

**THE LIBRARY:** was constructed in 1894. It was the childhood home of Emily Sears who later became Mrs. Henry Cabot Lodge. Its hand carved wooden paneling, marble fireplaces and hand painted gilt wall covering reflect the tastes of the wealthy Boston elite at that time.

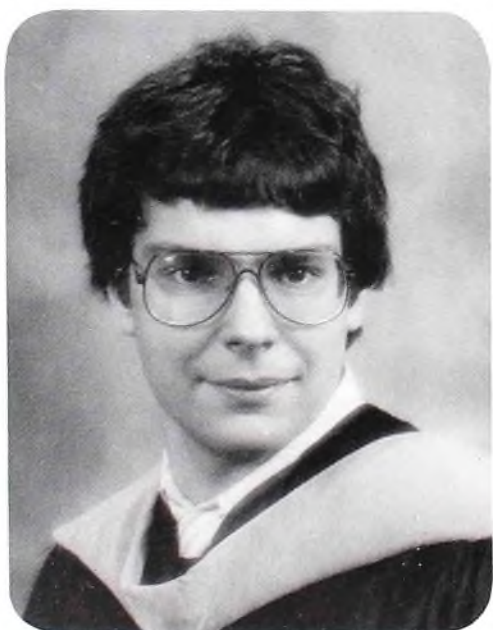


# ADOLPHUS CHUKWUGOZIE ANOSIKE, O.D.

VOSH



Volunteer Optometric Services to Humanity (VOSH) is an organization which gives its time and talent to deliver visual care to needy people throughout the world. Most of the emphasis has been on third world countries, where the need is greatest.

A typical VOSH mission will include ten to twenty people who are optometrists, optometry students and opticians. Each optometrist will examine 75 to 100 patients on a typical day. The hours are long and the pace hectic.

In March of 1984, five New England College of Optometry students and one faculty member participated in a vision clinic in Patzcuaro, Mexico. It was the first VOSH mission for the New England College of Optometry. In total, there were 23 volunteers who cared for the visual needs of 4,500 people over a five day period. A total of 3,500 glasses were dispensed, along with sunglasses and eyeglass cases.

We expect to hold our next mission in February, 1985 to Merida in the Yucatan area of Mexico. VOSH has grown to a total of 30 students under the direction of Domenic D'Angelo, Brenda Fogarty and Dr. Gary Moss.

## **CHERYL LANDRY, O.D. VALEDICTORIAN CLASS OF 1985**

Dr. Smith, Dr. Dupuis, members of the board, guests of honor, Dr. Kamens, Dr. Kozol, members of the faculty, parents, classmates, relatives and friends.

For most of us, this will be the last graduation in which we participate. Previously each graduation ceremony marked the transition from one academic level to a higher one. Today's graduation marks the transition from academic life to professional life. From this point on we will be applying the knowledge and experience for which these years have been preparing us.

We now have the opportunity to rekindle interests that we've had to put aside due to the pressures of studying and clinical assignments.

Not only have we put life on hold for ourselves but we've also affected our families, our spouses, our children and friends in the same way.

We owe thanks to all who have helped us achieve this degree.

First, the New England College of Optometry and its administration for providing direction and the opportunity for us to receive one of the finest clinical educations in the country, with rotations such as Walter Reed Army Hospital, Joslin Diabetic Center, Hadassah Hospital in Jerusalem, Omni Eye Clinic in Atlanta, several VA medical centers and many others. The College also provided an excellent library service.

Next we must thank the faculty, who not only teach but in many cases serve as role models. Some are in academics, some are in research, others are clinical instructors. Some combine outside practice with teaching. We can look at their success and satisfaction to help us determine the emphasis of our own careers.

We are truly grateful to our families for supporting us with time, understanding and financial resources. Parents, be proud that your daughter or son is now a doctor and a primary provider of eye care.

I would like to give my own personal thanks to my husband George, to my parents Joseph and Evelyn Landry, my brother Joe, and my friend Noelbis, who all played a large part in helping me through school.

I would like to thank Dr. Cliff Scott and Dr. Bob Parks for supporting me in my speech writing efforts.

I want to acknowledge and congratulate my classmate and friend Lisa Kralian who deserves to be delivering this address as much as I do.

We would also like to thank the president of the college, Dr. Dow Smith for his many years of dedicated service to the school. He will be retiring this year. We wish him well.

To the incoming president, Dr. Sylvio Dupuis, we welcome you. Your experience as a practitioner, AOA trustee, hospital president, and commissioner of health will be an asset to the college.

At this transition in the college's leadership, I'd like to take the opportunity to propose several views for consideration.

First, as we know, the physical facilities of the college- the administrative offices, classrooms and the Boston Eye Clinic are inadequate and plans have been made to consolidate them. To a large extent, the physical structure of a clinic determines the patient population. The current Boston Eye Clinic and the Rehabilitation Clinic are relatively inaccessible to the handicapped. To assure that students receive exposure to a wide variety of patients and problems, the clinics should have barrier-free designs and policies which make them attractive to the elderly and handicapped.

Second, many of the faculty are among the most capable in the profession. However, the clinical experience that an individual student receives varies widely depending on the experience and skill of the instructor. All clinical faculty should be required to be competent in the advanced level techniques that are available in that facility. All specialty clinics should provide update courses on a regular basis for their faculty.

Third, the clinical use of diagnostic pharmaceuticals does not occur on a regular basis until the fourth year and even then it is dependent upon the policy of the individual clinic.

Arrangements need to be made to allow a full range of diagnostic procedures to be implemented as needed during the initial patient visit in all college affiliated clinics.

The New England College of Optometry provides education for students who will be practicing in all states. The vast majority of states have laws which provide for the use of diagnostic pharmaceutical agents. The others are likely to have laws passed in the near future. In addition, a number of students from this year's class as well as from other graduating classes will be practicing in states where optometrists treat eye disease. The college owes these students the training and experience necessary to be licenses and practice competently in these states.

Finally, I'd like to say a few closing words to my classmates.

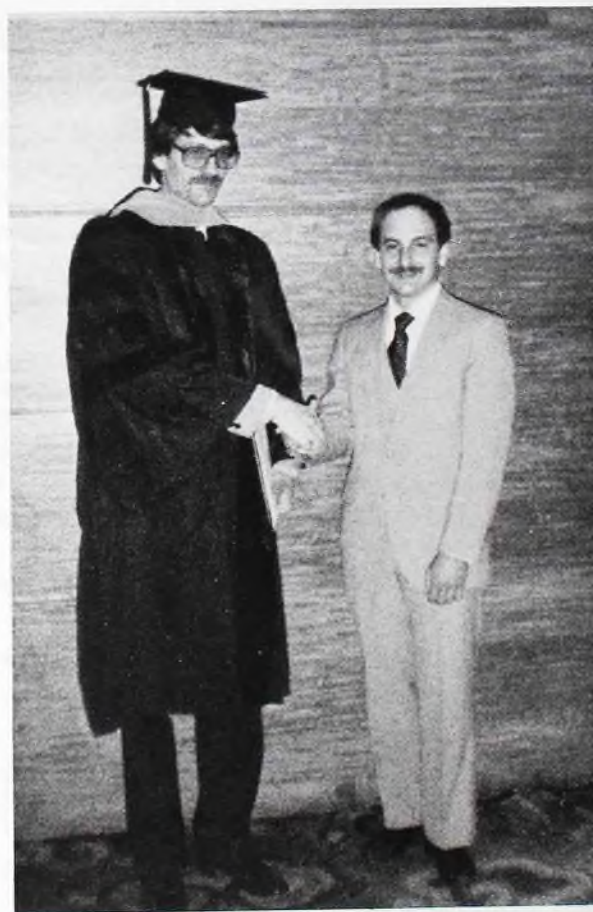
We should be proud and confident in our abilities. During the last four years we have obtained an in-depth knowledge of the eye and vision. Optometrists have more expertise to offer in vision care than any other group of professionals. To put optometry in the forefront of health care, we must strive to develop competency in new techniques and the use of new technology as it becomes available.

We must work for legislation which allows us to provide a full range of eye care services to our patients.

Optometry is practiced in a variety of setting: private or group practices, HMO's, community health centers, hospitals, corporate locations, teaching facilities, and the military. In whatever mode of practice we select, we must make sure that the quality of patient care is our primary concern.

The path that we now choose will determine how all of us look at optometry in the future.
