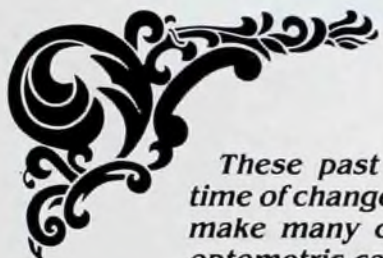

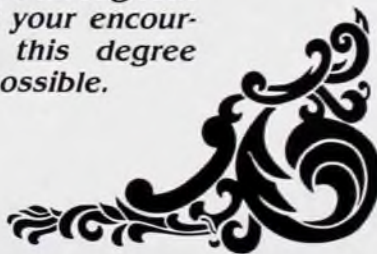


Dear Member of the Class of '88:

- Sept. 1984: 92 students enter 422 Beacon Street not knowing what fate awaited them.

- The world receives news of the starvation and famine in Ethiopia and forms relief agencies.

- Oct. 1984: Indian Prime Minister, Indira Gandhi, is assassinated by 2 of her bodyguards.

- Geraldine Ferraro becomes the 1st woman to be nominated as vice-presidential candidate running with Democratic nominee Fritz Mondale.

- In Nicaragua's 1st national election since 1979, voters choose Daniel Ortega with 63% of the popular vote.

- William J. Schroeder becomes the second man in history to receive an artificial heart.

- November 6, 1984: Republican incumbent Ronald Reagan wins reelection over Walter Mondale. Reagan at 73 is the oldest candidate ever to be elected U.S. President.

- Toxic gas leaks from a Union Carbide insecticide plant in Bhopal, India and kills 2,500 people many in their sleep. 200,000 others are affected and possibly blinded for life.



- Cuba agrees to take about 2500 immigrants back, all who were classified as criminals or mentally ill and entered the U.S. in 1980.

- Japan and U.S. begin discussing trade imbalance after U.S. congressmen and businessmen are publicly demanding stronger measures to counter the barriers keeping the U.S. goods out of Japanese markets.

- Arms control makes big news all this year. Meetings take place between U.S. Secretary of State George Schultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrey Gromyko. Mikhail S. Gorbachev visits London and speaks before the British House. He expresses deep concern of U.S. program called "Star Wars."

- Nelson Mandela refuses a government offer of freedom after being jailed for more than 20 years.

"Baby Doc" Duvalle & wife flee Haiti for a live in exile in the French Riviera.

To begin with, I want to say thank-you to my wife, Celeste, who supported me and encouraged me these past four years. I want to say good-bye to my classmates, and wish you all the best of luck. It's been my pleasure to get to know and become friends with many of you, and I look forward to keeping in touch as we go out into our careers.

I remember back in our first year, one of our professors said that the future of optometry would be decided in the state houses by the state legislatures around the country. I don't want to disagree with that, but right now I want to say that the future of optometry is sitting here in front of me today.

We've all earned the right to feel a little smug today, but what I mean is that we are the ones who must take responsibility for the future of optometry over the next 20 years or so. For some of us, taking responsibility for the future of optometry will mean assuming leadership roles in our profession, whether it be politically, in education, or in research. For others it will mean going out into practice and doing the best we can to care for our patients.

I believe NEWENCO has done a pretty good job of preparing us to go out into practice. It took a lot of our money in the process, but it did a good job. Now it's our responsibility to stay up to date with the latest developments in our field. We've all seen professionals whose education ended soon after they got out of school. Please don't become one of them.

To me, taking responsibility for the future of optometry also means working to expand the scope of our profession. In 22 states, optometrists have the right to prescribe medications to treat eye diseases. I see no good reason why it shouldn't be 50 states.

Some of our colleagues may ask, "Why should I worry about treating eye diseases when I'm doing fine fitting contact lenses on myopes?"

Ask anyone who was fitting a lot of aphakic lenses a few years ago how quickly things can change. Ophthalmology is not going to stand still. There may come a day, there probably will come a day, when there will be no more myopes. Where will optometry fit in a world full of pseudo-emmetropes? It won't fit unless we are willing to change, and anything we can do now to expand our scope is only going to help us in the future.

Too often in the past, optometry has been content with the status quo. Only recently has there been a strong movement for change within optometry, and I look forward to all of us becoming a part of that movement, a part of that change, and a part of that growth in our profession.

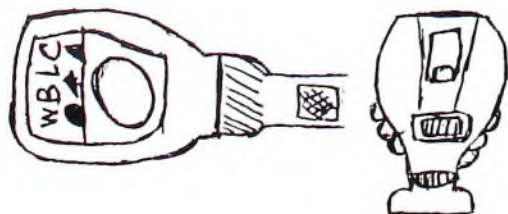

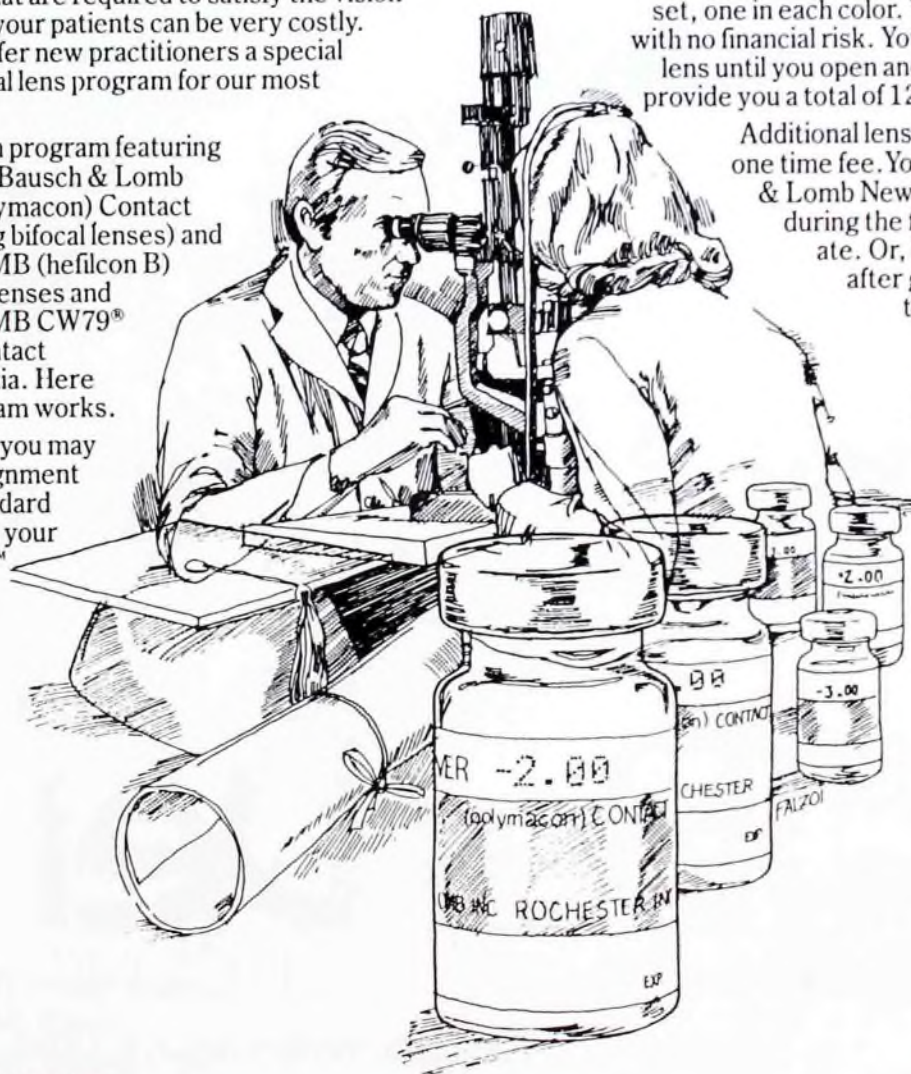
