# MESSAGE FROM THE CO-EDITORS



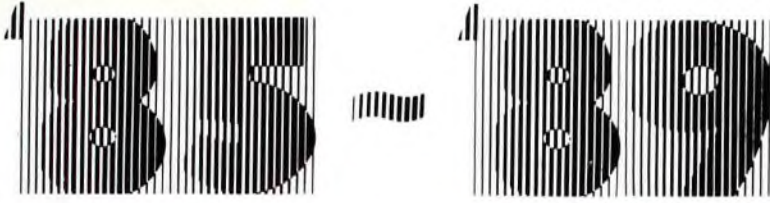


# DEDICATION

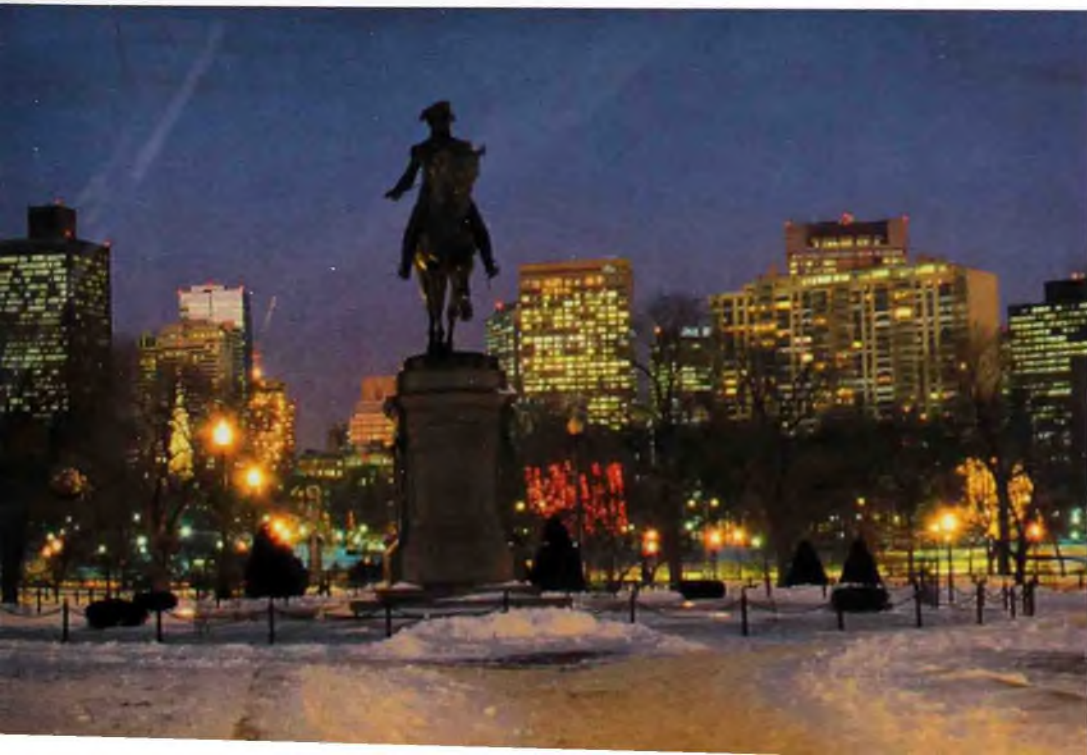
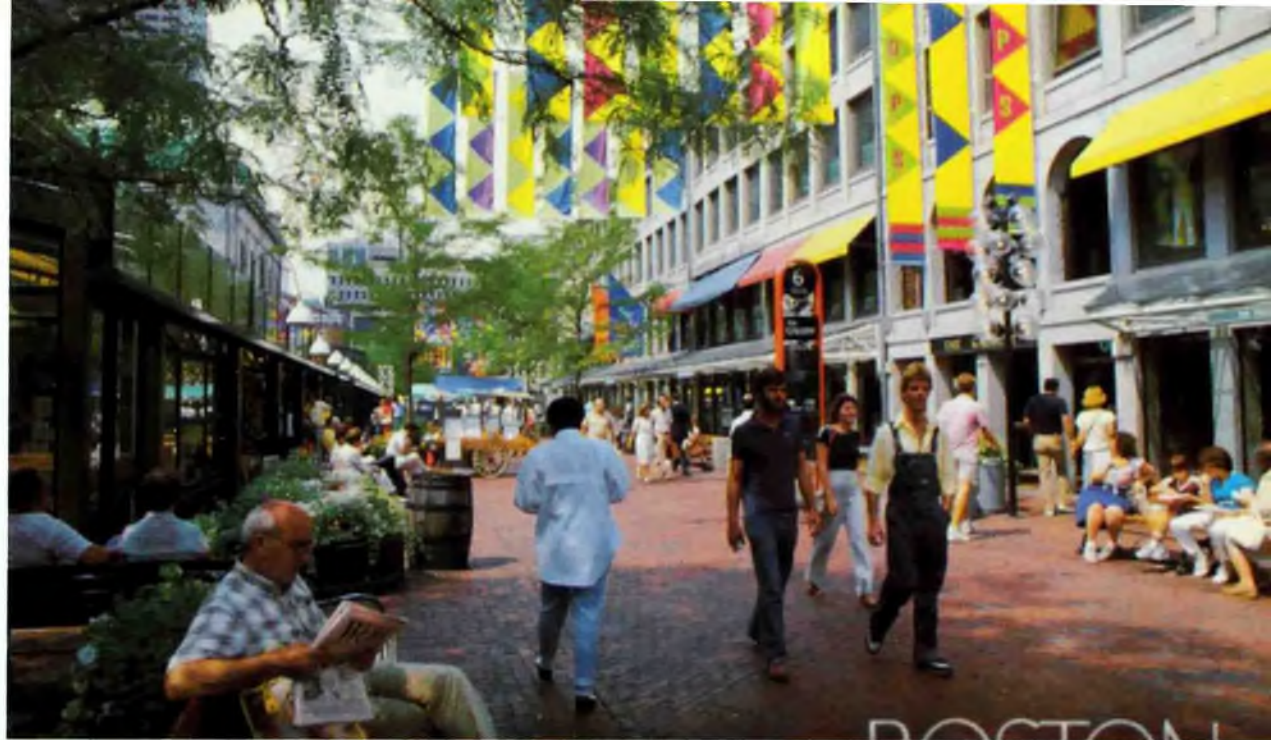




We came from different parts of the world and different walks of life to be directed along one path toward our common goal.

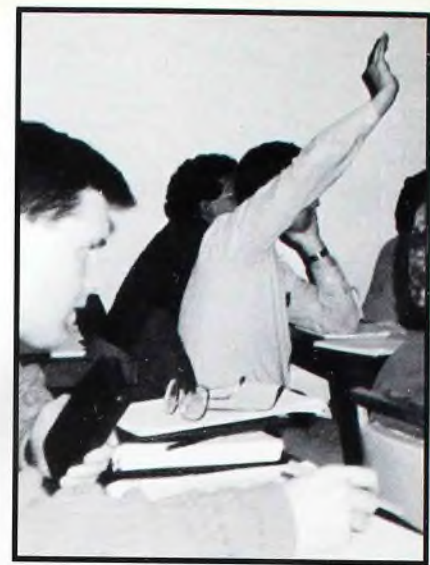
Despite our diverse backgrounds and philosophies, we came together to form NEWENCO'S class of 1989.

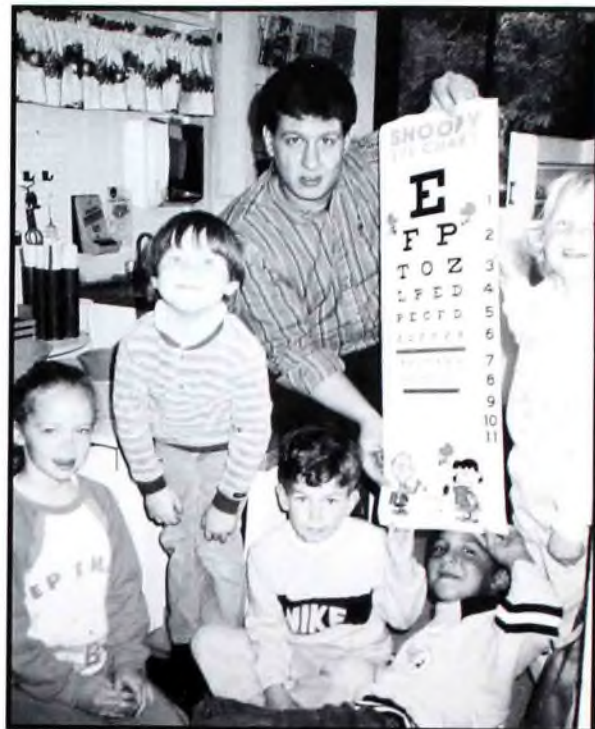




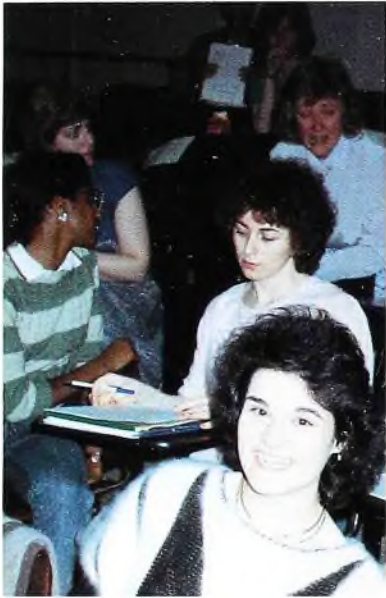
The site of our training would be in beautiful Back Bay, where so much was to be experienced culturally, historically and educationally. We were to enjoy the grandeur of Boston.

The last gasp of the imploding evangelical movement may have been represented by Jimmy Swaggart confessing his sin on TV.



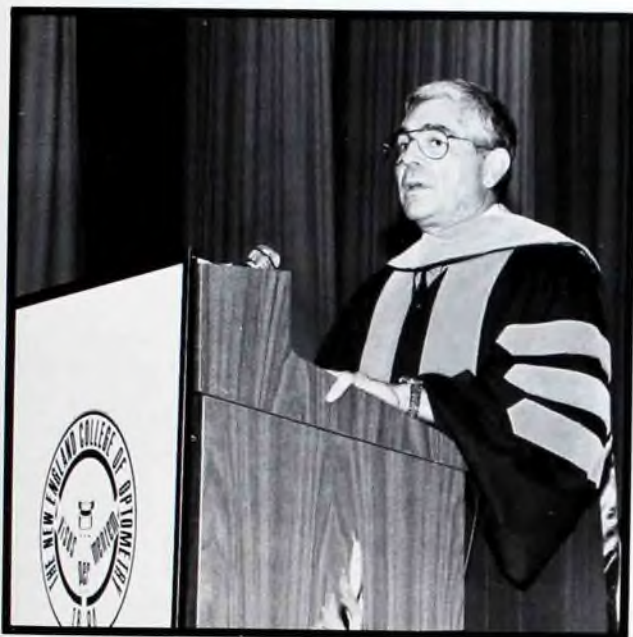

# VALEDICTORY ADDRESS 1989



Good afternoon friends, family, and faculty. Welcome to graduation '89! It has been said that graduation is the hiatus between academics and real life. I disagree, I think that it is all real life and this has been four years of real life that we are darn glad are over. We have all been looking forward to this day for a long time. At times it seemed like it would never come. We have our families and friends to thank for their financial and emotional support. We have our teachers to thank, without whom none of us would be here today.

I personally would like to give special thanks to my husband, David, who supported me on many levels throughout my schooling. As a dentist, David served as reminder of many of optometry's good points; no spit, no blood, and no needles. Even when you don't compare it to dentistry, I think we have all found optometry to be enjoyable and rewarding. And just think, soon we will be getting paid for it. Now that's exciting!

I wonder what each of us will be doing in the years to come. Optometry has never been more broad in its scope of practice. There are many settings in which to work and many areas of emphasis. There will be vision therapy specialists among us and there will be retinal disease specialists. Optometry is in a very dynamic phase of its existence. Within just the past few years we've seen the passage of a law allowing optometrists the use of diagnostic drugs in this state. A Massachusetts therapeutic drug law will be soon to follow as it has already in over twenty other states. The message in this is that our education is over only in the formal sense. Throughout our working lives we will be

challenged to keep abreast of new developments in optometry. But before we look to the future, I'd like to take a moment to look back to where it all began.

My first exposure to this school was as a patient at the Boston Eye Clinic. I was examined by several students and their many preceptors. Hours upon hours and many visits later I was delivered a pair of new contact lenses. Strangely enough, I was very impressed with the time spent and the care delivered. This demonstrates an important point. It is the quality of patient care that is important to us as optometrists, but it is the perception of the quality that is important to the patient. I read a recent editorial in the AOA Journal in which the following situation is described: A long time contact lens wearer walks into the optometrists office and describes her problem to the doctor. Based upon her history and a quick look with the slit lamp he is able to make his diagnosis and suggest the recommended treatment - no contact lens wear for 2 weeks followed by a refit. This doctor realized that discontinuation of lens wear is not something we contact lens wearers take lightly. So instead of presenting her with the facts immediately, he proceeded with a full battery of optometric testing, including perimetry, tonometry, and ophthalmoscopy. He followed that with an in depth discussion of his results. Not only had he provided a thorough and comprehensive exam, but now the patient had the confidence in this doctor to accept his diagnosis, and to proceed with the recommended treatment. As the author said, "Time spent is perceived as concern." Five years ago at the Boston Eye Clinic I'm sure that those extra hours of exam were not added in order to impress me, but I was impressed. The experience served as a catalyst in my desire for a career change.

A year later, there I was in classroom four where we all first met. We were nurses and pt's and teachers among others, all there to begin the slow and often painful metamorphosis into optometrists.

Of note is the fact that we were the first class to be more than 50% female. More and more women have realized that optometry is an ideal profession to combine with family life.

Much has transpired in the time between that first day and now. The first three years seemed like a constant steam of midterms and finals - with a few classes and labs thrown in between. Through these years we developed the fine art of taking multiple choice tests. "If in doubt, choose B". It always worked for me. At this point, I'd like to put in a word of thanks to the organizers and contributors to our note taking service. They sure made my life easier. This past year, we got a taste of what optometry is really about. the fourth year clinical program at NEWENCO is deserving of praise. Our experiences were varied and full. In combination with academics, I think we all had the exposure and preparation that with experience will make us optometrists this school can be proud of.

In closing, I would like to wish everybody the best of luck with all their endeavors, both professionally and personally.
